Reformation Sunday -10/25

Reformation Sunday is one of those days when we celebrate the past, while looking forward toward the future as well.

The past is the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. October 31st is the day that encapsulates it. On that day a young monk, Martin Luther (1483-1546), posted a collection of propositions for debate, now called "the 95 Thesis." For a variety of reasons, this seemingly simple act kicked off the Protestant Reformation. We celebrate Reformation Day on the Sunday prior to the first Sunday in November.

While Martin Luther is important for the Reformation, equally important is John Calvin (1509-1564). Because of Calvin, the city of Geneva in Switzerland became the intellectual center of the Reformation. Calvin, an attorney, scholar, theologian, but also a pastor, was an amazing person.

So, on Reformation Sunday, we look to the past, but a key phrase of the reformation also encourages us to look forward. That phrase in Latin is "Ecclesia Reformata, Semper Reformanda" – the "Church reformed and always reforming."

This Sunday will prompt us to look back to the truths and insights of the Reformers, it is even more important to look forward. Even in these critical times, it is good to know the church is still in the reforming mode.
